END-OF-COURSE STATE TESTING: APRIL 2019

Monday, April 15 to May 2

Please be aware that the upcoming months of April and May will include five (5) days of mandated Ohio Department of Education End-of-Course Testing. On each day, only the students testing in their graduation mandatory courses (English Language Arts 1, English Language Arts 2, US History, US Government, Algebra 1, Geometry & Biology) will attend school at the designated testing times. See the linked document below for each day of testing, the tests being administered and the time schedules for each. Regular daily bus transportation times will be maintained in the mornings and afternoons like any other school day.

BMHS STATE END-OF-COURSE TESTS 2019 CALENDAR: Testing Calendar

All students enrolled in any of our English Language Arts 1 and 2, Geometry, Algebra 1, Biology, US Government, and US History courses (regular, honors, CCP, AP, Ombudsman, online, etc...) are expected to arrive promptly for the graduation qualifying mandatory testing. Please note that on each of the indicated testing days, there are designated starting times for each of the separate tests. On each of the days of testing, students are expected to arrive in time for each of their scheduled test starting times.

Students and Parents please note:

- The format of testing will be online (not paper/pencil).
- Bring your own ear buds to listen to the test audio.
- Cell phones must be collected and turned-off. (maintenance of test security and preservation of WiFi bandwidth capacity)

As a state of Ohio graduation mandate, in addition to the required academic course work and necessary accumulation of credits, students must earn a total of 18 points attained through seven State **mandatory** End of Course Tests: Algebra 1, Geometry, English Language Arts 1, English Language Arts 2, Biology, American History and American Government. Students can earn from 1-5 points on each of these Tests. To ensure students are well rounded, they must earn a minimum of 4 points in Math, 4 points in English/Language Arts, and 6 points across Science and Social Studies.

Not meeting the above criteria would result in a student not earning a graduation diploma. Refusing to participate in this Testing will only result in a score of zero (0) and no accumulation of points towards the minimum 18 needed for graduation. This will not be permitted without signed consent of the Parent/Guardian and Principal.

ATTENTION ALL PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF CURRENT 11THE GRADE STUDETNS:

Please read the letter below from Rebecca Elder, the BCSD School Health Manager, with regard to the **REQUIRED** immunizations for all current 11th grade students which must be received by the students before the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year. Any student not current on these immunizations by September 12, 2019, will be excluded from attending school until the immunizations are up to date. If you have any questions, please call the BMHS School Health Specialists in the Clinic at 216-898-8900.

To Parents/Guardians of current 11th grade students:

In preparation for the 2019-2020 school year, this letter is to remind you that for the 2019-2020 school year, all students entering 12th grade are required to have two doses of Meningococcal vaccine prior to the start of school. However, if the student received their first dose on or after their 16th birthday, then just one dose of Meningococcal is required. Also, if the student is in 12th grade and is 15 years of age or younger, only one dose is required. Documentation of these immunizations are required to be sent to your child's school. If the child does not receive the immunization due to medical, religious or other reasons, an exemption form will need to be filled out and signed by the parent/guardian. This form will need to be filled out and signed each subsequent year.

If either immunization record or an exemption form are not received <u>within 14 days</u>, (<u>beginning with the first day of attendance</u>), Ohio Revised Code 3313.671 mandates that the student <u>will be excluded</u> until such time that the school receives proof of immunization or exemption letter. For the 2019-2020 school year, this date is **September 12**, **2019**.

Please be mindful of this requirement throughout the remainder of the school year, including spring break, and into the summer. Please save yourself a trip to the doctor's office at the beginning of the school year by obtaining proof of the immunization and sending it to the clinic at Berea Midpark High School at the time of your child's vaccination.

For your convenience, you or your child's physician may fax proof of immunization to Berea Midpark Clinic at 216-898-8558. Should you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact your School Health Specialist at 216-267-2079, or myself at 216-267-2120, ext. 8720. Also, you may visit the Berea City Schools website for complete information regarding all immunizations.

STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

With our increased enrollment and the challenges posed by our construction, we are grateful for the patience and cooperation that our students, parents, and staff have demonstrated during the busy times of arrival and dismissal. In order to best assure safe and effective student drop-off and pick-up, we ask that you comply with each of these expectations:

- Only students with valid parking tags, for either BMHS or Roehm Athletic Complex, may park in the designated spaces of their assigned lots. Cars without valid parking tags are subject to being towed unannounced.
- Student pedestrian crossing of streets is permitted only in the the designated cross-walk areas.

The students, several dads, granddads, brothers, and uncles asked no holds barred questions and engaged in important discussion with

our Berea Police Chief Joe Greco and BMHS Student Resource Officer Chuck Gute. The officers did not shy away from any questions and welcomed the open dialogue. When asked about the evening, SRO Gute stated, "the participants' questions and opinions were insightful into the minds of the younger and older generations." Senior, and RYP co-president, Parris Turner, also summed up his thoughts about the event: "I enjoyed the interaction and was impressed and touched by how much the police cared about our views and opinions. They were concerned with how they were perceived and genuinely interested in building better relationships



and they join the RYP family with wanting to bring us closer on what we can do for positive change."



The ladies at the RW/RT forum tackled the subject of mean girls, cyberbullying and gossip. Women from the corporate, education, and community sectors served as panelists and the discussions with the students, several moms, grand-mothers, sisters and aunts were meaningful and liberating. FROM THE CLINIC: ASTHMA


Does your child have a cough that he or she never seems to get over? Or do they sometimes wheeze or have shortness of breath or tell you they feel tightness in his or her chest? Children who feel this way may have asthma. You can't catch asthma from someone but it often runs in families. While there is no cure, asthma can be controlled. People with asthma can live normal, healthy lives and even be an Olympian, if the asthma is controlled. It is important that they go to a doctor and get checked out. Asthma is a lung disease that can be very serious. When a person with asthma inhales or is around a trigger, the airways tighten and become swollen. This causes what is called an asthma attack or episode which makes it hard to breathe. It is important for people with asthma to avoid their triggers, take their medication and talk to their doctor.

What triggers asthma or makes it worse? Some asthma triggers are:

- Mold
- Tobacco smoke
- Pet dander
- Pollen
- Exercise
- Strong smells or odors
- Cold Air

Once you have signed up, the cost of the trip is locked in. The cost increases \$50-\$100 every six months so the sooner your student signs up, the cheaper the cost. Ifyou sign up at least two years in advance, you get a \$200 discount from most of the companies (see website). This makes monthly payments much more attainable. There are also a variety of fundraising options available.




