TRAVEL THE WORLD

The Berea City School District offers trips, which are not connected to specific classes, for BMHS high school students. Middle School students may sign up early for a savings benefit.

Once you have signed up, the cost of the trip is locked in. The cost increases \$50-\$100 every six months so the sooner your student signs up, the cheaper the cost.

If you sign up two years in advance, you get a \$200 discount from most of the companies (see website). This

makes monthly payments much more attainable. There are also a variety of fundraising options available.

If you need to cancel, each company has a refund schedule along with added insurance options.

STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

With our increased enrollment and the challenges posed by our construction, we are grateful for the patience and cooperation that our students, parents, and staff have demonstrated during the busy times of arrival and dismissal. In order to best assure safe and effective student drop-off and pick-up, we ask that you comply with each of these expectations:

- Only students with valid parking tags, for either BMHS or Roehm Athletic Complex, may park in the designated spaces of their assigned lots. Cars without valid parking tags are subject to being towed unannounced.
- Student pedestrian crossing of streets is permitted only in the the designated cross-walk areas.
- Buses only are permitted in the designated "flag pole" lot area directly in front
 of the building, during student arrival and dismissal times.
- Drop-off & pick-up of students is permitted only in the designated school parking lot area – not on the streets of Bagley, Eastland, or Maple.
- Vehicles which are entering & exiting the lot may do so only through the designated areas and following the indicated traffic flow.

Newborns are checked in the hospital nursery. In the first year of life children should be checked at each doctor's visit. Between the ages of three and five they should be checked for alignment and sharpness of vision by an eye care professional. Students are screened at school within the first sixty days of preschool. They are also screened in kindergarten, first, third, fifth, seventh and ninth grades. A student can also be tested any time a teacher or parent suspects a vision problem.



Watch for frequent eye rubbing, light sensitivity, poor focusing, unusual eye movement, chronic redness or tearing of the eyes and report these symptoms to your doctor. Whiteness near pupils, the inability to see objects at a distance, difficulty

reading or seeing the blackboard, squinting or sitting too close to the television are all signs your child needs to be evaluated by an eye doctor. If caught early, many eye conditions can often be reversed. Please make eye exams a part of your child's routine physical.

Please contact your student's SWGHC school health specialist in your local school clinic for any questions or concerns.

FROM THE SUPERINTENDANT, MIKE SHEPPARD

Winter weather has arrived early this year. New for the 2018-19 school year is the addition of a **2-hour delay**. Information regarding this new procedure was included in the 2018-19 District Information Guide. This information guide was available at the start of the school year during our open houses and orientations. 2-hour delay information is also included below.

Our district administration, faculty, and staff understand that our decision to delay, open, or close schools during inclement weather has a big effect on families. We also understand that our students are better served – both academically and socially – by being in school. However, our top priority is the safety of our students.

HOW DO WE MAKE OUR DECISION?

Please understand that we make the decision to delay, keep open, or close the schools in bad weather based on a careful analysis of all relevant factors, such as:

Information on road conditions from transportation staff and from local law enforcement and road crews. We must give careful consideration to the most dangerous roads in the district; they can be treacherous even if your street looks clear;

- Amount of snow and ice accumulated;
- Whether or not the precipitation will continue throughout the day;
- Temperature and wind chills at or below -15F;
- Weather predictions (including those from a weather alert service);
- Storm timing;
- Building conditions (such as whether they have electricity and heat);
- Parking lot conditions.

TWO-HOUR DELAY - NEW FOR 2018-19

The use of a two-hour delayed school opening may be utilized when the additional two (2) hours would allow for inclement weather to rise to an acceptable level. With the option of the two-hour delay, we will more likely be able to have school and avoid using as many calamity days.

A major part of a two-hour delay school opening involves the transportation of students to schools. Under a two-hour delay schedule, all schools will begin the day two (2) hours later than the regular starting time. The school day will end at the usual time. Students receiving school bus transportation should go to their normal bus stop location two (2) hours later than their regular pick-up time.

As with school closings, the two-hour delay to the start of the school day will be announced through the local media and our telephone message system to parents. If for any reason the two-hour delay is not sufficient to ensure safe travel, the District will close for the entire day. If this is the case, a second call will be made via our telephone messaging service.

WHO MAKES THE DECISION?

As Superintendent of Schools, I am ultimately responsible for the final decision based on the above factors and recommendations from the Assistant Superintendent in charge of buildings and grounds.

WHEN IS THE DECISION MADE?

We strive to make the decision to close by 5:30 a.m. or earlier so we can notify our parents via our automated calling system and then the radio and TV stations. Keep in mind that unusual weather conditions may force us to make the decision after this time. In any case, we will notify parents via the automated calling system as the first alert.

WILL WE CLOSE SCHOOL IF CONDITIONS WORSEN?

Even if the weather conditions worsen, we cannot reverse our decision in the morning without endangering students. Once we make the decision to open the schools, many parents rely on it and leave for work. If we then send students right back home, many will return to unsupervised bus stops and empty houses. If conditions get worse during the school day, we may need to have an early dismissal and will give as much notice as possible to parents. Although we do our absolute best in this process, I know that often no perfect decision exists. If you do not feel that it is safe for your child to get to school, use your best judgment whether or not he or she should attend. If you choose to keep your child at home, his/her absence will be counted as an excused absence. Also, please discourage teenagers from driving in bad conditions and offer them alternatives as weather conditions worsen.

HOW IS THE PUBLIC NOTIFIED?

As soon as we make the decision to close schools, we will send an automated message via the designated telephone numbers that parents have given us. It is important for families to have correct contact information in their students' Infinite Campus accounts. This will allow the District's automated messaging system to quickly reach you, via phone, email, and text, with school closing information. This will be the quickest and easiest way to learn about school closings. In addition, the Berea City Schools will post the closing on the website www.berea.k12.oh.us.

For those who use social media, you can follow the district on Twitter @BereaCSD or Facebook/BereaCSD, as we will also post it there. Tune to TV channels ABC, CBS, NBC, WUAB, and/or FOX for up-to-date information on school closings. Do not call the school or bus garage unless it is an emergency.





Dear Families, Administrators, Teachers and Staff,




Out of the 139 respondents, 126 were parents, 12 were staff members, and 1 person did not answer. I wish we had more results to share but with everyone's busy schedules there is not enough hours in the day to get everything completed as we want.

To address some of the areas that need work, PTSA will be working directly with Mr. Ruggiero to form a plan to make things better at BMHS.

We will be improving the signage at the main entrance, so it is more easily seen by visitors, parents, staff and students. The plan will be to use the printing company in BMHS to print a new banner that will hang outside the main office. Yes, in case you were not aware the school, through a Polaris program, has a printing company that is run by students that print everything from banners to yard signs to t-shirt transfers. Another area that most people marked Unknown is the area of volunteering. This is a tricky area because, at the high school level, there are not as many opportunities to volunteer like in elementary school. Plus, there are many groups (Athletic Booster, Orchestra Booster, Performing Art Booster, Band Booster, Post Prom and RYP) in the school for parents to support so the volunteer opportunities are more spread out and don't always come directly from the school or PTSA itself. But one way to volunteer is by joining PTSA, you give your support in the number of members we have which gives a stronger voice to make changes for all kids at the district, state and national levels. Overall the survey results were good and we all should be very proud of the environment we have created for our students. In the other 5 standards of the PTA's National Standard for Family-School Partnership, we scored either always or frequently. Two-Hour Delay Procedures Berea City School District

In accordance with the Berea City School District's Procedures for Emergency School closing, the use of a two-hour delayed school opening may be utilized when the additional two hours would allow for wind chill temperatures to rise to an acceptable level. With the option of the two-hour delay, we will more likely be able to have school and avoid using as many calamity days.

A major part of a two-hour delay school opening involves the transportation of students to schools. Under a two-hour delay schedule, all schools will begin the day two hours later than the regular starting time. The school day will end at the usual time. Students receiving school bus transportation should go to their normal bus stop location two hours later than their regular pick-up time. When the Superintendent calls a two-hour delay, the following adjustments will be made:




