FROM THE PRINCIPAL

On Tuesday, March 12, Juniors will be taking the ACT test as part of the mandated Ohio State testing program. Juniors, 11th graders, will report to their assigned rooms by 7:15am. Room lists will be posted around the building. Any junior who took the ACT with accommodations, earlier this month, does not need to attend.

Freshmen (9th graders), Sophomores (10th graders) and Seniors (12th graders) need not attend BMHS at all on the testing date of March 12, 2019. However, Polaris Career Center Seniors are expected to regularly attend their Polaris classes.

Because of the length of the ACT testing for Juniors, there will be **no** modified bell schedule of classes after the March 12th testing. There are no classes scheduled after testing concludes. Junior students will be dismissed at approximately 12:00 noon.

Bus transportation will be provided at that time.

Students are encouraged to bring their own calculators. Graphing calculators are permitted. Please know that the mathematics section of the ACT does not require the use of a calculator; however, students are permitted to use them.

We will have non-graphing calculators available for students to use.

TRAVEL THE WORLD

The Berea City School District offers trips, which are not connected to specific classes, for BMHS high school students. Middle School students may sign up early for a savings benefit. Check out the available trips at: https://www.berea.k12.oh.us/travel

Once you have signed up, the cost of the trip is locked in. The cost increases \$50-\$100 every six months so the sooner your student signs up, the cheaper the cost. If you sign up at least two years in advance, you get a \$200 discount from most of the companies (see website). This makes monthly payments much more attainable. There are also a variety of fundraising options available.

If you need to cancel, each company has a refund schedule along with added insurance options.

- 2020 trips include: **Peru:** Chaperone is Mrs. Pinter; **Paris/London/Rome**, Chaperone is Mr. Soos; and **Sustainable Living/Germany**, Chaperone is Dr. McElyea. All trips are open for enrollment.

STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

With our increased enrollment and the challenges posed by our construction, we are grateful for the patience and cooperation that our students, parents, and staff have demonstrated during the busy times of arrival and dismissal. In order to best assure safe and effective student drop-off and pick-up, we ask that you comply with each of these expectations:

- Only students with valid parking tags, for either BMHS or Roehm Athletic Complex, may park in the designated spaces of their assigned lots. Cars without valid parking tags are subject to being towed unannounced.
- Student pedestrian crossing of streets is permitted only in the the designated cross-walk areas.
- Buses only are permitted in the designated "flag pole" lot area directly in front of the building, during student arrival and dismissal times.

FROM THE CLINIC: BE POISON SMART

National Poison Prevention Month is in March. Annually, over one million children under the age of five are poisoned. A child's natural curiosity means they are always getting into things which includes harmful substances around the house. Here are some important steps you can take to prevent your child from ingesting a poisonous or dangerous substance.

- Never leave any medications or vitamins out where children can reach them.
- Never tell a child medication is candy or tastes like candy.
- Household cleaning products should be kept locked up and out of reach.
- Remember child resistant packaging does not mean child proof.
- Alcohol can have a negative impact on children and teens of all ages so be sure to keep it locked up.
- Never try a home remedy for poisoning: call the Poison Center.
- Keep the Poison Center number by the phone: 1-800-222-1222.
- Obtain a list through the Ohio Department of Health of hazardous items in our homes.



DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS:

Computer Science/Business/FCS Department is offering new classes that give students the opportunity to develop employable skills and earn certifications in this growing field of study. Our goal is to encourage students to explore a rapidly advancing field that has a severe shortage of employees. We encourage students to take advantage of these great opportunities!

- AP Computer Science: Students learn the Java programming language. This language is the foundation for many different applications and employment opportunities. Students will have the opportunity to sit for the AP test at the end of the course and earn college credit based on their test score.
- APP Design and Development: Students learn the programming language Swift. This class offers students the opportunity to start at their level of programming experience and move forward at their own pace. This class may be repeated allowing students to continue to build their knowledge and continue to develop their apps. This class is the basis for developing apps that can ultimately be submitted to the APP Store.
- **Digital Media:** Students have the opportunity to explore and learn at their pace through project based learning 2 programs of their choice in the Adobe Suite (Photoshop, Animate, After Effects, Premiere, Dreamweaver). Students work together and create projects as they learn. They have choice as to the projects they complete and the information they learn. They can repeat this class to investigate topics further in depth or learn additional programs.
- Gaming Design and Development: Students learn basic game design principles while playing games. They
 also learn basic programming structures and start developing their own games. This class is being restructured so
 students can develop games at their own pace and level. Students will have a variety of development platforms to
 choose from. Some those platforms include: Alice, Game Maker, and Unity.
- MOS Microsoft Office Specialist Certification; New to BMHS is a course entitled Computer Applications with Microsoft Certification. After only one semester, the curriculum and course has proven to be just what the students need to master Word and Excel. Thirty-three students have earned Microsoft Office Specialist Certification. This certification validates proficiency in productivity tools and technology and prepares students for future academic and workforce opportunities.

HPE DEPARTMENT: The HPE Staff is Mr. Eckert, Mr. Fleming, Ms. Hunter, Mr. Nigro, Mrs. Ritchie and Mrs. Will.

The BMHS Health classes have had several speakers come in throughout the year. Recently, our students had the opportunity to gain valuable information from the Cleveland Rape Crisis Center, Life Act, Cleveland Clinic Cancer Center and Operation Keepsake. All of these organizations reinforce the units and lessons the students are being taught in the course. We have also partnered with the Baldwin Wallace University Nursing Program in order to deliver a hands on basic CPR workshop for each of our Health students.

- Physical Education (9th Grade Class) is an awesome opportunity for our students to learn about basic nutrition and healthy choices while developing a foundation in fitness. These students learn how to zone train with a state-of-the-art heart rate monitor system, which helps them to develop great fitness habits and an understanding in different ways to train.
- Team Sports and Basketball courses continue to be popular choices among our students. They continue to enjoy the benefits of physical fitness and competitions on a regular basis in these courses.
- Stress Management courses are growing each year. More and more students and athletes enjoy learning valuable techniques and strategies to help cope and relieve stress in their daily lives while also learning many fitness skills and concepts to use in living a healthier lifestyle.
- **Cycling** is in full swing with their training. Students participate in both teacher lead and student lead workouts on a daily basis. Students are tracking their fitness and training with the heart rate monitor system and are working toward achievable goals set at the beginning of the semester.
- Advanced Weight Training course is continuing out of the Roehm Athletic Complex. Students are using state of the art equipment daily as they work on developing their strength and athleticism while using technology. Custom workouts are sent to each student daily through an online fitness program. Coaches and student athletes are able to track their program.



FROM THE SUPERINTENDANT, MIKE SHEPPARD

Winter weather has arrived early this year. New for the 2018-19 school year is the addition of a **2-hour delay**. Information regarding this new procedure was included in the 2018-19 District Information Guide. This information guide was available at the start of the school year during our open houses and orientations. 2-hour delay information is also included below.

Our district administration, faculty, and staff understand that our decision to delay, open, or close schools during inclement weather has a big effect on families. We also understand that our students are better served – both academically and socially – by being in school. However, our top priority is the safety of our students.

HOW DO WE MAKE OUR DECISION?

Please understand that we make the decision to delay, keep open, or close the schools in bad weather based on a careful analysis of all relevant factors, such as:

Information on road conditions from transportation staff and from local law enforcement and road crews. We must give careful consideration to the most dangerous roads in the district; they can be treacherous even if your street looks clear;

- Amount of snow and ice accumulated;
- Whether or not the precipitation will continue throughout the day;
- Temperature and wind chills at or below -15F;
- Weather predictions (including those from a weather alert service);
- Storm timing;
- Building conditions (such as whether they have electricity and heat);
- Parking lot conditions.

TWO-HOUR DELAY - NEW FOR 2018-19

The use of a two-hour delayed school opening may be utilized when the additional two (2) hours would allow for inclement weather to rise to an acceptable level. With the option of the two-hour delay, we will more likely be able to have school and avoid using as many calamity days.

A major part of a two-hour delay school opening involves the transportation of students to schools. Under a two-hour delay schedule, all schools will begin the day two (2) hours later than the regular starting time. The school day will end at the usual time. Students receiving school bus transportation should go to their normal bus stop location two (2) hours later than their regular pick-up time.

As with school closings, the two-hour delay to the start of the school day will be announced through the local media and our telephone message system to parents. If for any reason the two-hour delay is not sufficient to ensure safe travel, the District will close for the entire day. If this is the case, a second call will be made via our telephone messaging service.

WHO MAKES THE DECISION?

As Superintendent of Schools, I am ultimately responsible for the final decision based on the above factors and recommendations from the Assistant Superintendent in charge of buildings and grounds.

WHEN IS THE DECISION MADE?

We strive to make the decision to close by 5:30 a.m. or earlier so we can notify our parents via our automated calling system and then the radio and TV stations. Keep in mind that unusual weather conditions may force us to make the decision after this time. In any case, we will notify parents via the automated calling system as the first alert.

WILL WE CLOSE SCHOOL IF CONDITIONS WORSEN?

Even if the weather conditions worsen, we cannot reverse our decision in the morning without endangering students. Once we make the decision to open the schools, many parents rely on it and leave for work. If we then send students right back home, many will return to unsupervised bus stops and empty houses. If conditions get worse during the school day, we may need to have an early dismissal and will give as much notice as possible to parents. Although we do our absolute best in this process, I know that often no perfect decision exists. If you do not feel that it is safe for your child to get to school, use your best judgment whether or not he or she should attend. If you choose to keep your child at home, his/her absence will be counted as an excused absence. Also, please discourage teenagers from driving in bad conditions and offer them alternatives as weather conditions worsen.

HOW IS THE PUBLIC NOTIFIED?

As soon as we make the decision to close schools, we will send an automated message via the designated telephone numbers that parents have given us. It is important for families to have correct contact information in their students' Infinite Campus accounts. This will allow the District's automated messaging system to quickly reach you, via phone, email, and text, with school closing information. This will be the quickest and easiest way to learn about school closings. In addition, the Berea City Schools will post the closing on the website www.berea.k12.oh.us.

For those who use social media, you can follow the district on Twitter @BereaCSD or Facebook/BereaCSD, as we will also post it there. Tune to TV channels ABC, CBS, NBC, WUAB, and/or FOX for up-to-date information on school closings. Do not call the school or bus garage unless it is an emergency.

Two-Hour Delay Procedures Berea City School District

In accordance with the Berea City School District's Procedures for Emergency School closing, the use of a two-hour delayed school opening may be utilized when the additional two hours would allow for wind chill temperatures to rise to an acceptable level. With the option of the two-hour delay, we will more likely be able to have school and avoid using as many calamity days.

A major part of a two-hour delay school opening involves the transportation of students to schools. Under a two-hour delay schedule, all schools will begin the day two hours later than the regular starting time. The school day will end at the usual time. Students receiving school bus transportation should go to their normal bus stop location two hours later than their regular pick-up time. When the Superintendent calls a two-hour delay, the following adjustments will be made:




