FROM THE PRINCIPAL

END-OF-COURSE STATE TESTING: APRIL 2019

Please be aware that the upcoming months of April and May will include five (5) days of mandated Ohio Department of Education End-of-Course Testing. On each day, only the students testing in their graduation mandatory courses (English Language Arts 1, English Language Arts 2, US History, US Government, Algebra 1, Geometry & Biology) will attend school at the designated testing times. See the attached document for each day of testing, the tests being administered and the time schedules for each. Regular daily bus transportation times will be maintained in the mornings and afternoons like any other school day.

All students enrolled in any of our English Language Arts 1 & 2, Geometry, Algebra 1, Biology, US Government, and US History courses (regular, honors, CCP, AP, Ombudsman, online, etc...) are expected to arrive promptly for the graduation qualifying mandatory testing. Please note that on each of the indicated testing days, there are designated starting times for each of the separate tests. On each of the days of testing, students are expected to arrive in time for each of their scheduled test starting times.

Students and Parents please note:

- The format of testing will be online (not paper/pencil).
- Bring your own ear buds to listen to the test audio.

- Cell phones must be collected and turned-off. (maintenance of test security and preservation of Wi-Fi bandwidth capacity)

BMHS STATE END-OF-COURSE TESTS 2019 CALENDAR: Testing Calendar 2018-19

As a state of Ohio graduation mandate, in addition to the required academic course work and necessary accumulation of credits, students must earn a total of 18 points attained through seven State **mandatory** End of Course Tests: Algebra 1, Geometry, English Language Arts 1, English Language Arts 2, Biology, American History and American Government. Students can earn from 1-5 points on each of these Tests. To ensure students are well rounded, they must earn a minimum of 4 points in Math, 4 points in English/Language Arts, and 6 points across Science and Social Studies.

 Accelerated 	4 points
 Proficient 	3 points
•Basic	2 points
•Limited	1 point
 No Score Available 	0 point

Not meeting the above criteria would result in a student not earning a graduation diploma. Refusing to participate in this Testing will only result in a score of zero (0) and no accumulation of points towards the minimum 18 needed for graduation. This will not be permitted without signed consent of the Parent/Guardian and Principal.

STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

With our increased enrollment and the challenges posed by our construction, we are grateful for the patience and cooperation that our students, parents, and staff have demonstrated during the busy times of arrival and dismissal. In order to best assure safe and effective student drop-off and pick-up, we ask that you comply with each of these expectations:

- Only students with valid parking tags, for either BMHS or Roehm Athletic Complex, may park in the designated spaces of their assigned lots. Cars without valid parking tags are subject to being towed unannounced.
- Student pedestrian crossing of streets is permitted only in the the designated cross-walk areas.
- Buses only are permitted in the designated "flag pole" lot area directly in front of the building, during student arrival and dismissal times.
- Drop-off & pick-up of students is permitted only in the designated school parking lot area – not on the streets of Bagley, Eastland, or Maple.
- Vehicles which are entering & exiting the lot may do so only through the designated areas and following the indicated traffic flow.

FROM THE CLINIC: SELF-INJURY AWARENESS

Self – injury is a deliberate, non-suicidal behavior of harming the surface of your body to relieve emotional distress, anger and frustration. Self-harm is not a mental illness but a behavior that indicates a lack of coping skills. Several illnesses are associated with it including borderline personality disorder, depression, eating disorders, anxiety or post-traumatic distress disorder. Self-harm occurs most often during the teenage and young adult years though it can also happen later in life. Those at the most risk are people who have experienced trauma, neglect or abuse. People who have friends who self-injure are more likely to begin to self-harm. While self-injury may bring a momentary sense of calm and a release of tension, it's usually followed by guilt, shame and the return of painful emotions.

Signs/symptoms of which to be aware:

- Scars
- Fresh cuts, scratches, bruises or other wounds.
- Excessive rubbing of an area to create a burn
- Keeping sharp objects on hand
- Wearing long sleeves/long pants even in hot weather
- Difficulties in interpersonal relationships
- Statements of helplessness, hopelessness or worthlessness

Forms of self-injury:

- Cutting (cuts/severe scratches with a sharp object)
- Scratching
- Burning (with lit matches, cigarettes, or hot sharp objects)
- Carving words/symbols on skin
- Hitting/punching
- Piercing skin with sharp objects
- Pulling out hair
- Persistently picking at or interfering with wound healing.

Self-injury usually occurs in private and is done in a controlled or ritualistic manner that often leaves a pattern on skin. Most frequently, the arms, legs and front torso are the targets of self-injury, but any area of body may be used. People who self-injure may use more than one method to harm themselves.



TRAVEL THE WORLD

The Berea City School District offers trips, which are not connected to specific classes, for BMHS high school students. Middle School students may sign up early for a savings benefit. Check out the available trips at: https://www.berea.k12.oh.us/travel

Once you have signed up, the cost of the trip is locked in. The cost increases \$50-\$100 every six months so the sooner your student signs up, the cheaper the cost. If you sign up at least two years in advance, you get a \$200 discount from most of the companies (see website). This makes monthly payments much more attainable. There are also a variety of fundraising options available.

If you need to cancel, each company has a refund schedule along with added insurance options.

- 2020 trips include: **Peru:** Chaperone is Mrs. Pinter; **Paris/London/Rome**, Chaperone is Mr. Soos; and **Sustainable Living/Germany**, Chaperone is Dr. McElyea. All trips are open for enrollment to the classes of 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023.

Two-Hour Delay Procedures Berea City School District

In accordance with the Berea City School District's Procedures for Emergency School closing, the use of a two-hour delayed school opening may be utilized when the additional two hours would allow for wind chill temperatures to rise to an acceptable level. With the option of the two-hour delay, we will more likely be able to have school and avoid using as many calamity days.

A major part of a two-hour delay school opening involves the transportation of students to schools. Under a two-hour delay schedule, all schools will begin the day two hours later than the regular starting time. The school day will end at the usual time. Students receiving school bus transportation should go to their normal bus stop location two hours later than their regular pick-up time. When the Superintendent calls a two-hour delay, the following adjustments will be made:




