Students may sign up in the Activities Office to donate. Students must be sixteen (16) to donate and have a completed and signed Parent Permission Slip on file.



PTSA REFLECTIONS PROGRAM




STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

With our increased enrollment and the challenges posed by our construction, we are grateful for the patience and cooperation that our students, parents, and staff have demonstrated during the busy times of arrival and dismissal. In order to best assure safe and effective student drop-off and pick-up, we ask that you comply with each of these expectations:

- Only students with valid parking tags, for either BMHS or Roehm Athletic Complex, may park in the designated spaces of their assigned lots. Cars without valid parking tags are subject to being towed unannounced.
- Student pedestrian crossing of streets is permitted only in the the designated cross-walk areas.
- Buses only are permitted in the designated "flag pole" lot area directly in front of the building, during student arrival and dismissal times.
- Drop-off & pick-up of students is permitted only in the designated school parking lot area – not on the streets of Bagley, Eastland, or Maple.
- Vehicles which are entering & exiting the lot may do so only through the designated areas and following the indicated traffic flow.

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS: SOCIAL STUDIES

Greetings to all Parents and Students:

The Social Studies Department has had an exciting and action packed first nine weeks.

To best serve and prepare the students at Berea-Midpark High School, the Social Studies Department has continued to meet weekly in our TBT's that we started last year. These are teacher-based teams grouped together for World Studies, American Government, and US History. Our goal each week is to share and collaborate with other teachers that are teaching the same class. We address topics such as pacing, evaluation, common assessments, and curriculum. The ultimate goals are to improve our teaching by comparing assessment results and data as well as to continue to prepare the students to pass the AIR/End of Course tests that are given in Government and US History in April. Thanks to the Berea Board of Education, and the Curriculum Department, our department received more Chrome Book carts to use for assessment for the End of Course exam/AIR tests classes. All of our teachers have been utilizing the Chrome Book carts and the educite website to

our teachers have been utilizing the Chrome Book carts and the edcite website to use the assessment tools on edcite to mimic the AIR test set up on the test in April.

Juniors in Government classes at Berea-Midpark are working on their volunteer hours for the Citizenship Project (CP). The CP is a requirement by the Berea City Schools Board of Education. Each junior at Berea-Midpark must take Government as a state requirement for graduation; part of the requirement of the Government classes being to complete the CP. If the CP is not completed the student will not graduate. The students have been very busy helping in the community.

Mr. Murphy's Economics Honors class will travel to Parker-Hannifin with Mr. Bob Griffin to tour the facility and get hands on experience and exposure to the business world through Junior Achievement and the Titan stock experience.

Mr. Watt has been busy with Junior State of America and Model UN while Mrs. Fox is very busy working with PRIDE to get ready for the "Into the Light" walk for suicide awareness. Mr. Braaten has incorporated technology and edcite in his classes with the help of a Google Chrome Book cart and has set up his classroom to look like a classroom will look in the new building. Mr. Kosar is teaching AP Psychology, Mr. Boone is teaching AP American History and is continuing with Chess Club. Mr. Hanchuk is teaching AP European history, Mr. McGregor is teaching AP Government, Mr. Santori teaches US History and AVID, while Mr. Barther, Mr. Swisher and Mr. Carpenter teach World Studies. Mr. Misenhelder is teaching Economics and Mr. Hungk is teaching US Government and World Studies. Mr. Hunek is teaching US Government and World Studies.

FROM THE CLINIC: DIABETES—What It Is, What It's Not

Diabetes is a condition resulting from the cells and tissue of the body not being able to use glucose (sugars) as energy but instead remains in the blood. There are two main types of diabetes. Diabetes type 1 which results when the body makes no or very little insulin. Diabetes type 2 which is usually when the cells of the body do not respond well to the insulin that is created by the body.

High glucose levels (hyperglycemia) can damage vital body organs so it needs to be treated. Treatment options today are aimed at controlling sugar levels consistently and safely throughout the day and may include oral medication, injections of insulin or insulin given through a portable pump that is attached to the body.

Low blood sugar is a **MEDICAL EMERGENCY**. Signs and symptoms include: headache, shakiness, sweating, dizziness, tiredness, and/or slurred speech. This is the number one side effect of insulin treatment.

Low blood sugar requires medical attention and treatment with an appropriate source of sugar.

- It is NOT an anxiety/panic attack.
- It is NOT contagious.
- It is NOT a result of bad parenting, bad choices or a punishment.
- It is treatable but at present type 1 is not curable.

Diabetes at school can be managed through the help of our Southwest General School Health Specialist who is in the clinic each school day. Together, we partner with families, students, and staff to help make the educational process safe and productive for those with diabetes.



PRIDE PRESENTS "MIX IT UP DAY"

PRIDE is hosting their annual "Mix It Up Day" on Tuesday, November 20th. This is a national program which encourages students to get to know someone new and and thereby tear down barriers which divided students, such as social groups, race, ethnicity, sex or gender, religion, etc. Students from PRIDE, JSA and AVID will be partnered with other students and go to each other's classes during the school day and meet back together as a group during eleventh period. BMHS will practice an Intruder/Active Shooter ALICE Drill on Friday, November 9th. We will be following an AM TAP period that day to conduct the training and drill. Below are listed the general talking points which will be reviewed with the students that morning prior to the actual practice drill beginning. Please feel free to go over these talking points with your students beforehand.

Lockdown: Intruder/Active Shooter ALICE Training and Talking Points

These are only a few suggestions as an active shooter event is dynamic and evolves quickly. When there is an active shooter incident and you CAN evacuate the building:

- Trust your instincts
- If you can evacuate, DO IT
- Run away from the building with students as quickly as possible. Relocation site is at Baldwin Wallace University Sports Center/Gym.
- Call 911

When there is an active shooter incident and you are UNABLE to evacuate:


- Take shelter in the nearest office, room, or closet
- Lock the door if possible.
- Barricade the door with anything you have available. (desks, chairs, etc.)
- Tie down the door, if possible, by using a belt attached to the door handle.
- Cover any windows that may be in the doors.
- Look for alternate escape routes. (windows)
- Call 911
- Set your cell phone to vibrate or silent.
- Stay low to the ground and remain as quiet as possible.
- Breathe to manage your fear stay focused.
- You may have to take the offensive if the shooter enters your area. Gather weapons (pens, pencils, books, chairs, etc.) and mentally prepare your attack.
- Position yourself in the room in a location that will allow for the element of surprise if the shooter enters the room.

If the shooter enters your room and you cannot escape the area:

- FIGHT!!!
 - 1. Throw anything available at the shooter, aiming at the face to distract his/her aim.
 - Attack in a group (swarm)
 - Use all available weapons to attack and secure the shooter (ANYTHING can be a weapon)
 - Grab the shooter's extremities (arms, legs, head) and take him/her to the ground using body weight to secure them.
 - 5. FIGHT DIRTY! Kick gouge eyes to what you need to do to incapacitate them.

If you have incapacitated the shooter:

- Call 911 and advise law enforcement
- Provide your location and stay on the line, if possible.
- Secure the suspect (belts, body weight, etc.)
- Move any weapons away from the shooter. DO NOT HOLD A WEAPON!
- Do not appear threatening to responding law enforcement
- Provide first aid to others in the room.


